Como padre o encargado de un estudiante que asiste a una escuela que recibe dólares federales del Título I, tiene derecho a conocer las cualificaciones profesionales del (de los) maestro(s) y asistente(s) de instrucción que enseñan a su hijo.

La ley federal exige que cada distrito escolar del Título I cumpla y le brinde la información solicitada de manera oportuna. Todas las escuelas tienen en su archivo una lista de docentes y sus cualificaciones profesionales. En cualquier momento, puede preguntar:

- Si el maestro cumplió con los requisitos estatales y los requisitos de certificación para el grado y la materia que él/ella está enseñando,
- Si el maestro recibió un certificado de emergencia o condicional mediante el cual se renunciaron las calificaciones estatales, y
- Qué títulos universitarios o de posgrado posee el maestro, incluidos los certificados de posgrado y títulos adicionales, y la(s) especialización(es) o área(s) de concentración.
- Si su hijo recibe ayuda de un asistente de instrucción y, en caso afirmativo, sus calificaciones.

La Ley Cada Estudiante Triunfa (ESSA por sus siglas en inglés), que se promulgó en diciembre de 2015, incluye solicitudes adicionales de derecho a saber. En cualquier momento, puede solicitar:

- Información sobre las políticas con respecto a la participación de los estudiantes en las evaluaciones y los procedimientos de exclusión, y
- Información sobre evaluaciones requeridas que incluyen:
 - o materia examinada,
 - o propósito de la prueba,
 - o origen del requisito (si corresponde),
 - o el tiempo que les lleva a los estudiantes completar la prueba y
 - o tiempo y formato de difusión de resultados.

Toda la información anteriormente mencionada se puede solicitar a través del director de su escuela.

Nuestro personal está comprometido a ayudar a su hijo a desarrollar las habilidades que necesita para tener éxito en la escuela y más. Ese compromiso incluye asegurarse de que todos nuestros maestros y asistentes de instrucción cumplan con los requisitos aplicables del estado de Pensilvania. Esperamos con ansias el próximo año escolar, y juntos haremos una diferencia en la vida de su hijo.

- ما هي درجات تخرج الدراسات الجامعية أو ما قبل التخرج التي يحملها المعلم ، بما في ذلك شهادات الدراسات العليا والشهادات الإضافية ، والتخصص الرئيسي أو منطقة (مناطق) التركيز.
- ما إذا كان طفلك يتلقى المساعدة من مساعد مهني ، وإذا كان الأمر كذلك ، مؤهلاته/ مؤهلاتها.

يتضمن قانون كل طالب ينجح (ESSA) ، الذي تم توقيعه ليصبح قانوناً في ديسمبر 2015 ، إضافة الي طلبات الحق في المعرفة. في أي وقت ، يمكنك أن تطلب:

- معلومات عن السياسات المتعلقة بمشاركة الطلاب في التقييمات وإجراءات الانسحاب ، و
- معلومات عن التقييمات المطلوبة والتي تشمل:
 - الموضوع الذي تم اختباره ،
 - الغرض من الاختبار ،
 - مصدر المتطلبات (إن وجد) ،
 - مقدار الوقت الذي يستغرقه الطلاب لإكمال الاختبار ، و
 - وقت وطريقة نشر وعلان النتائج.

يمكن طلب جميع المعلومات المذكورة أعلاه عن طريق مدير مدرستك.

Dear Parents / Guardians:

As a parent or guardian of a student attending a school that is receiving Federal Title I dollars, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the teacher(s) and instructional paraprofessional(s) who instruct your child.

Federal law requires every Title I school district to comply and to provide you with the requested information in a timely manner. All schools have on file a listing of faculty members and their professional qualifications. At any time, you may ask:

- whether the teacher met state qualifications and certification requirements for the grade level and subject he/she is teaching,
- whether the teacher received an emergency or conditional certificate through which state qualifications were waived, and
- what undergraduate or graduate degrees the teacher holds, including graduate certificates and additional degrees, and major(s) or area(s) of concentration.

You may also ask whether your child receives help from a paraprofessional. If your child receives this assistance, we can provide information about the paraprofessional's qualifications.

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), which was signed into law in December 2015, includes additional right to know requests. At any time, you may request:

- Information on policies regarding student participation in assessments and procedures for opting out, and
- Information on required assessments that include:
 - subject matter tested,
 - purpose of the test,
 - source of the requirement (if applicable),
 - amount of time it takes students to complete the test, and
 - time and format of disseminating results.

All of the above information can be requested through your school principal.

Our staff is committed to helping your child develop the skills he/she needs to succeed in school and beyond. That commitment includes making sure that all of our teachers and paraprofessionals meet applicable Pennsylvania state requirements. We look forward to the upcoming school year, and together we will make a difference in your child's life.
