Dear PAS Families:

It was great to see so many people for student conferences. We cannot do this work alone. Parent-teacher conferences are a regular time to come together to discuss your child's strengths and needs. Please get in touch with your classroom teacher if you could not attend conferences during the scheduled window. We are happy to schedule a time to meet that works for you.

To better support the community, our team created a communication flow chart to help families navigate guestions and concerns they may have about school life. We have hyperlinked the student handbook and other important documents for you to have a look at. This is in draft form. We are open to feedback to make sure this document meets your needs. If there's anything else that may be helpful to add, please get in touch with me.

We are elevating the district code of conduct (which was also mailed to all families in the fall) and our bullying and harassment policy. It is important that all families understand the expectations for student behavior so we can support each other across our community.

A few weeks ago, members of our leadership team started a middle school Black affinity group. Black PAS students shared candidly about microaggressions that they experienced at school or online. Incidents against marginalized students harm the whole school community. We are working through restorative practices and proactively addressing these issues in our lessons and during social-emotional learning and morning meetings. We cannot do this work alone. We need your help to ensure all children feel welcome in our community. Three years ago, former PAS students who are black advocated for change. One of their demands was to ensure the parents in the community were doing work to support positive racial relations in the community. We can do this. We can learn together through events offered by the school and district. Please be sure to look for more events in the months to come. In the meantime, please take a look at the resources on talking to your children about race below.

Every morning during the announcements, we ask our students to be mindful to take care of themselves, take care of others, and take care of the school community. Living into our core values and following these three simple expectations can help us make PAS a place of learning that is safe, inclusive, and welcoming to our students. Thank you in advance for taking the time to review this with your children.
